John Reeves – an original plant seeker

The original 'plant seekers' rank amongst the most famous names in horticultural history and travelled to China during the 19th century. John Reeves, Robert Fortune, and George Forrest were all intrepid explorers, and each made some remarkable and highly significant discoveries.

When the RHS was first founded as the Horticultural Society in 1804, Britain had not established an embassy in China, but the Society's founder, Sir Joseph Banks, used every opportunity to encourage research into plant life there. John Reeves, who lived in Canton for around two decades from 1812, was actually the East India Company tea inspector at the time but also happened to be a member of the Society. From 1817, he began sending plants and drawings of plants from China and the RHS Lindley Library houses a collection of over 800 of these, many of which have age-related and water damage. This collection, much of which has never been seen in public, forms a priceless record of many wellknown species dating back to their initial discovery and importation to the UK. What better way for the RHS to celebrate John Reeves' important work than by offering tours to China almost 200 years after his initial visit. All profits received by the RHS for the sale of these tours will be used to help restore this incredible collection. You will also receive a personal invitation to view the collection once available for public view.

TRAVELS IN CHINA

A first hand account from Roy Lancaster, who led the inaugural RHS Garden Holidays Plant Seekers Tour.



For garden enthusiasts there can be few experiences more thrilling than following in the footsteps of the plant-explorer heroes of the late 19th and early 20th centuries. The 15 day RHS Garden Holidays Plant Seekers tour, which I helped design and co-hosted in May 2014, is just that – a visit to what EH Wilson famously referred to as 'The Mother of Gardens', to see, growing in their countries of origin, plants so familiar to them from their own gardens.

Our first stop was sacred Emeishan, which at 3,099m is by no means China's highest mountain, but is certainly one of the holiest, and one of the richest in its variety of plants, nearly 4000 species at last count. Our first experience of the flora was a late-afternoon sortie around Fuhu Temple. where many plants, familiar and less so, included a large specimen of rare endemic Cycas szechuanensis, with its extraordinary yellow, leafy terminal cones.

The next day, we ascended the mountain summit, observing a wealth of plants enroute, among which *Ichyoselmis* (*syn. Dicentra*) macrantha and Anemone daviddi were in full flower, as was Rhododendron faberi and the rare Sorbus helenae introduced to the west by EH Wilson, who first visited this mountain in 1903.

The next stop was in the upper regions of the course of the Min River – somewhere that featured quite heavily in Wilson's travels in Sichuan. In flower-studded alpine pastures, we were delighted to discover a miniature golden kingcup, *Caltha scaposa* and *Polygonatum hookeri*, a tiny Solomon's seal. That afternoon came a particular highlight, the delicate *Primula palmata* and minute greenflowered *Kingdonia uniflora*, a curious member of the buttercup family named after Frank Kingdon Ward who discovered it.



We travelled on to the mountainous Jiuzhaigou National Park – with its lush forests, lakes and impressive waterfalls. Here we

wandered through the forest, examining treasures such as an outstanding lady's slipper orchid, *Cypripedium tibeticum*, and the lovely *Dipelta elegans*, barely known in western gardens. Throughout our walk, familiar shrubs included *Deutzia longifolia* and *Philadelphus subcanus*, their branches heavy with white blossom.



Our visit to Kunming Botanic Garden was a chance to see a fine specimen of Cathaya argyrophylla, known as the 'panda of the plant world' such is its rarity. We also visited the Stone Forest at Shilin, where a wealth of plants included two shrubs, Pistacia weinmanniifolia with rich crimson young growths and Mahonia duclouxiana with bold foliage, as well as a form of Chinese ivy, Hedera nepalensis var sinensis. The mahonia and ivy are grown in the UK, although neither is common; the Pistacia I have yet to see in a garden here, its tender nature preventing it from being widely grown.

The final highlight was a visit to the Jade Dragon Snow Mountain range. Here, we walked into the hills to the Gang Ho Ba Valley, and saw conifers such as *Pinus yunnanensis*, *Picea likiangensis* and *Larix potaninii* as well as three species of evergreen oak. An absolute treat was the rare Daphne calcicola; sadly its yellow flowers had faded, but those of diminutive *Iris barbatula* and three Roscoea species were still in evidence.



During our time on this tour we were constantly reminded of the great plant collectors and explorers – names of whom are commemorated in the plants we saw and we will continue to be reminded of and indebted to them whenever we visit a garden in the future.

Days 1-2: Fly to Chengdu Fly overnight from the UK to Chengdu. This evening, get to know your fellow garden enthusiasts at a welcome reception with your RHS hosts.

Day 3: Leshan

Travel to Leshan to visit the Grand Buddha which, at 71 metres, is the world's largest stone Buddhist monument. This UNESCO World Heritage-listed site is carved into a hillside overlooking the confluence of the Dadu and Min Rivers – a short boat trip gives excellent views. Continue on to Emeishan and visit Fuhushi Temple, an atmospheric temple surrounded by lush forest.

Day 4: Emeishan Explore sacred Emeishan, a revered Buddhist mountain, notable for its exceptionally diverse vegetation – a tenth of China's plant species are found here. Examine the species at Emeishan's Rare Botanical Garden before taking a cable car up to Wannian Temple where there will be time to explore. The afternoon is yours to admire the striking, ever shifting, natural beauty of the mountain and its setting. The RHS guides will take you to some significant botanical spots before returning to Chengdu.

Day 5: Huanglong

Fly to Nine Villages Valley and transfer to Huanglong. Hundreds of pools in vivid colours, formed by thousands of years of mineral deposits, tumble gently down the Huanglong Valley. A diverse forest ecosystem, the area also lies close to the intersection of four flora regions: the tropical and subtropical zones of the Northern Hemisphere, Eastern Asia and Himalaya – spend the afternoon studying plant life.



Day 6: Explore the Nine Villages Valley A World Biosphere Reserve of ragged peaks, sapphire lakes, abundant forest and rushing waterfalls, the Nine Villages Valley is considered one of China's most beautiful areas. It is home to over 2,500 recorded plant species and more than 150 tree species. Take a bus to the far end of Rize Valley to explore the primeval forest – a rich stretch of virgin forest full of untamed flora and fauna. Hike back through the valley passing the park's many vivid lakes, admiring the spectacular sights, and plant life en route.

Day 7: Nine Villages Valley Return to the Nine Villages Valley to continue absorbing the wonderful sights. Enjoy the breathtaking views from Long Lake, high at the head of the valley, and admire Five Coloured Pool, renowned for having the most varied and intense colours of all the park's lakes. Drive to Songpan, where there is time to explore.

Day 8: Fly to Kunming Transfer to the airport for your flight to Kunming via Chengdu.

Day 9: Kunming Botanical Gardens

Spend the morning in the lovely Western Hills, surrounded by evergreen forest scenery. This afternoon, see the fascinating species of the Kunming Botanical Gardens, which has a particular focus on flora that is endemic to Yunnan Province.

Day 10: The Stone Forest Meander through the formations of the UNESCOlisted Stone Forest, where towering limestone pillars stand treelike in a fascinating illusion of petrified woodland. The rest of the day is free to spend at your leisure – Kunming, the capital of Yunnan, is a laidback city that is lovely to explore.

Day 11: Lijiang

Fly from Kunming to Lijiang. The quintessential Chinese 'old town', Lijiang's old quarter is a jumble of cobbled streets, precarious wooden buildings and rustic stone bridges – in short, a delightful place to aimlessly wander. Spend a free afternoon doing just that.

Day 12: Jade Dragon Snow Mountain

Today we follow in the footsteps of famous botanist Joseph Rock. Visit the fascinating Lijiang Alpine Botanic Garden, built jointly with Royal Botanic Garden Edinburgh and Kunming Institute of Botany. Discover the fascinating Baisha village, where the local Naxi people live much as they did 500 years ago during the Ming Dynasty, before taking some time to explore around the Baishui area. Visit Yufeng Temple en route back to the hotel.

Day 13: Ganghoba Valley Explore the mysterious Ganghoba Valley where there is a wealth of majestic mountain scenery and diverse flora to enjoy.

Day 14: Chengdu

Fly to Chengdu. This afternoon is at leisure to explore and in the evening, enjoy a performance of Sichuan Opera.

Day 15: Fly Chengdu to UK Fly to the UK, arriving home the same or following day.

Days 1-2: Fly to Shanghai Fly overnight from the UK to Shanghai. This evening, get to know your fellow garden enthusiasts at a welcome reception with your RHS hosts.

Day 3: Chenshan Botanical Garden

Spend the day exploring the Shanghai Chenshan Botanical Garden with a private guide. Covering 200 hectares and packed with over 9,000 species, Chenshan is comprehensive and beautifully landscaped. It is categorised into 26 special gardens. This evening view the glittering city of Shanghai from the waters of the Huangpu River – the best way to really appreciate the juxtaposition of the charming colonial architecture of the Bund and the futuristic skyline of Pudong.

Days 4-5: Suzhou's Ancient Gardens

Drive to the charming Garden City of Suzhou, renowned for its historic gardens. Over the next two days you will visit four paramount examples of classical Chinese garden design – the Humble Administrator's Garden, Master of the Nets Garden. Lingering Garden and Lion Forest Garden. As well as being exquisite and elegant these historical 'Mountain and Water' gardens perfectly demonstrate the importance of harmony and natural beauty in Chinese culture. There'll also be a relaxed cruise on the thousand year old Grand Canal on the first evening.

Day 6: Travel to Hangzhou This morning is free for you to spend as you wish – Suzhou has more than 50 classical gardens as well as a quaint old centre and plenty of traditional waterside architecture to

explore. Travel to the imperial city of Hangzhou, set in the midst of a lush agricultural region.

Day 7: Explore Hangzhou Enjoy a morning exploring the diverse flora of the Hangzhou Botanical Garden before taking part in a tasting of locally-grown tea. In the afternoon, stroll around the legendary West Lake which exudes old-world oriental charm with banks draped with willow trees and dotted with ancient pagodas. Visit the Lakeshore Garden where you may see peach trees, lotus and osmanthus.

Day 8: Travel to Tunxi

This morning is free for personal exploration of Hangzhou - there are plenty of interesting sites to visit. Travel to Tunxi, the gateway to the Huangshan Scenic Area.

Day 9: Mt Huang

Much celebrated, and an endless source of inspiration in Chinese art and literature, Mt Huang (Yellow Mountain) is a granite massif of towering peaks crowned with swirling mists. Spend the day soaking up the breathtaking sights and take the Yungu cable car up to the summit, where we will spend the night. There are plenty of fern, moss and tree species to examine.

Day 10: Mt Huang Sunrise Get up early for a magical sunrise over the jagged peaks and continue to savour the spectacular scenery for the rest of the morning. Travel back down the mountain by cable car and return to Tunxi.

Day 11: Jingdezhen

Travel to the charming city of Jingdezhen, known as China's 'Porcelain Capital'. Quality ceramics have been produced here for 1,700 years. Visit the museum and factory to discover more about the production process. Continue on to Lushan.

Day 12: Lushan

Explore the Lushan Botanical Garden with an expert guide. The garden is close to the summit of Lu Mountain, a significant cradle of Chinese history and culture. Admire the views from Wulao Peak. The rest of the day is free to explore Lushan at leisure.

Day 13: Lushan

Visit Lushan Flower Diameter Park; Jinxiu Valley, known for its rich ecosystems and wide variety of flowers; and the fascinating Xianren Cave. Head to the picturesque Lulin Lake and explore the plantlife of Lushan.

Day 14: Fly to Shanghai Take a morning flight to Shanghai. This afternoon wander around the delightful Yu Gardens.

Day 15: Fly Shanghai to UK Fly to the UK, arriving home the same or following day.

Day 7: Terracotta Warriors The Terracotta Army of Emperor Qin Shi Huang has intrigued visitors since their fortuitous discovery in the 1970s. Spend the morning viewing the enigmatic ranks of life-like warriors. En route visit a pomegranate farm with an introductory talk to gain an insight into the local agriculture. Savour an afternoon of relaxation at the Huaqing Hot Springs.

Day 8: Xian

Explore the Xian Botanical Gardens accompanied by an expert guide. Take an afternoon stroll on the beautifully preserved 14th century city walls that enclose Xian's old town. Explore the atmospheric alleys of the Muslim Quarter and the many Islamic food stalls. Find tranquillity in the gardens of the Grand Mosque.

Day 9: Fly to Guilin

Fly to the charming city of Guilin. Join an expert guide to explore the Guilin Botanical Gardens, where you'll find over 3,000 species of subtropical plant life.

Day 10: Li River Cruise

Take a relaxed cruise on the thousand year old Grand Canal and visit a local silk mill where you'll be able to follow the age-old silk production process from the cultivation of silkworms up to creating the final piece. Visit two paramount examples of classical Chinese garden design – the Humble Administrator's Garden and the Master of the Nets Garden.
