


covering some of the many wonders of China, whilst the other four explore the extensive beauty and numerous treasures of Southeast Asia.



CULTURAL CAPERS

Many of these cultural activities have their roots in ancient traditions. Calligraphy, which you can try your hand at in Beijing, has evolved throughout China's history to become the symbolic art form of the oriental world, whilst water puppetry in Vietnam, which originated amongst the rice paddies of old, tells stories of old feudal practices mixed with folklore - you can chat to a puppeteer and enjoy a private performance in Hanoi.





LOCAL TASTES

Dining on the local cuisine can give an excellent insight into a society. Tasting and having a go at making local foods introduces you to traditional, local ingredients and the techniques that are likely to have been perfected over centuries. Acquaint yourself with the traditional Chinese dumpling (a symbol of wealth, family and happiness) in Xian where dumpling making has developed into an art form - join local chefs to learn how to craft these tasty morsels. In Vietnam local ingredients and local spices fresh from local fields are

combined to create the mouth-watering dishes of one of the world's most highly regarded cuisines - the traditional town of Hoi An is the perfect place to get to grips with the basics of it.



DIG DEEPER

Exploring things more deeply, whether it is a historical site or a wider region, is a sure way to gain a load of knowledge about your chosen country and its culture. By looking more closely at a destination's heritage you'll be able to form a better idea about why it is the way

it is. For example being accompanied by an archaeologist as you view the Terracotta Warriors allows you to learn about the rituals of death and the afterlife in Chinese philosophy. Furthermore getting off the tourist trail to explore more extensively you'll be able to meet local people and glimpse the way they live their lives on a day to day basis - cruising deep into Vietnam's Mekong Delta region gives a look at rural lifestyles that you wouldn't otherwise see.



FINALLY, DO AS THE LOCALS DO

What could be a more authentic experience than taking a bit of time to join in with what the local people do? You can eat with the residents of Saigon at their favourite food stalls before sitting back and sinking an icy beer as you explore the city's fantastic street food scene or raise at the crack of dawn to come together with the Tai Chi enthusiasts that practice every morning in Beijing's parks. What better way to interact with people, the heart and soul of any country, than by rubbing shoulders with them as they go about their everyday lives.

Macau's unique history, combining both Portuguese and Chinese influences, gives it a rich culture that is different to its neighbours, making it the perfect extension to any trip to China. It offers visitors the chance to eat delicious food, enjoy exciting nightlife and experience a blend of cultures, all only a short ferry ride, direct from Hong Kong airport.

Here's how to spend the perfect 48 hours...

DAY 1



Morning

A walk through Macau's Historic Centre throws up an absorbing web of different styles and influences. In among its traditional streets there are more than 20 different heritage sites to visit, from churches, temples and shophouses to a lighthouse, library and theatre. Collectively, they make a fitting introduction to the destination's East-meets-West personality.

Pit stop

Take time out for a Macanese lunch. This being the Far East, the chance to eat good food is a central part of the experience, and the local cuisine is an inventive merger of culinary traditions and flavours from Europe, Africa, Asia and South America.

Afternoon

Comprising a neat row of five sensitively restored residences from the 1920s, the Taipa Houses-Museum gives an insightful overview of the Macanese life of that era that shaped latter-day Macau, showcasing authentic furniture, photographs and everyday items.

DAY 2

Morning

With its cobbled streets and quiet squares, Coloane Village gives a taste of a calmer, slower Macau. Order a fresh pastel de nata (egg tart) from the original Lord Stow's Bakery, then call in at the nearby Macau Giant Panda Pavilion.



Afternoon

Visit the 1,109ft-high Macau Tower for a giddy view over the islands and the South China Sea, then ratchet up the experience by choosing one of the adrenaline activities on offer from a Skywalk around the rim to the world's highest bungee jump.



After dark

After dinner, make the most of Macau's nightlife by venturing to one of its rooftop bars for a grandstand view of the city skyline. Or why not experience the spectacular House of Dancing Water. This water-based show is billed as the most spectacular production the world has ever seen with high diving acrobatics and somersaulting motorbikes.



PLANT SEEKING IN CHINA

We recently caught up with Jim Gardiner, Executive Vice President of the Royal Horticultural Society, who led our signature RHS Garden Holiday to China in May 2014, 'Plant Seekers'. Our range of horticultural tours is proving very popular and attracts both the amateur gardener as well as the keen horticulturists among you. Here Jim explains what fascinates him about China's horticultural heritage.

"A visit to China must surely be on most keen travellers' 'must do' lists, but for plant lovers such as myself, it has always been towards the very top.

China has been a source of wonder and inspiration to garden lovers for more than 200 years, and is estimated to contain a staggering one eighth of the world's plant biodiversity. As such it has made a huge contribution to our own gardens in the UK, with many of the plants that we consider every day features - such as Rhododendron, Camellia and Primula - having originated from China.

The horticultural significance of China was first realised in the early 19th century, before the days of a British Embassy. Our own society was founded as the Horticultural Society in 1804, and one of our founders, Sir Joseph Banks, was particularly keen to encourage research into plant life in China. Over the subsequent 120 years or so, names that are now recognised as the heroes of horticultural history – Ernest Wilson, George Forrest, Frank Kingdon-Ward and Robert Fortune – all travelled to the country on horticultural expeditions. George Forrest was probably the most intrepid, getting in to some quite extraordinary scrapes on his seven trips to Yunnan, from where he sent back over 30,000 herbarium specimens and discovered many new plant species.

So when the first RHS Garden Holiday to China was launched at the beginning of 2012 - the concept of a Plant Seekers tour, where we could literally follow in the footsteps of these original Plant Seekers, held great appeal.

This trip of a lifetime spans 15 days, travelling from Chengdu to Emeishan, Nine Villages Valley, Chuanzhusi, Kunming and Lijiang and is an absolute treat for any enthusiastic plantsman. The area covered – including the provinces of Sichuan and Yunnan – is the South West of the country, with a diverse geography encompassing lush tropical and temperate forests, huge rivers, high snowy peaks and magnificent lakes.

From a cultural perspective it is also fascinating – and reflects the enormity of China as a country as

well as the many facets of its culture. Bordering on to Tibet, Vietnam, Laos and Myanmar and not so far from the northern reaches of India, the region is rich in Buddhist Temples, ancient monuments and traditional towns and villages.

Horticultural highlights include Emeishan (also known as Mount Omei), where the tour begins. Some 130km southwest of Chengdu, it is one of the Middle Kingdom's four famous Buddhist Mountains and home to monasteries and temples, some dating back to the advent of Buddhism itself in China in the 14th century. It is also a veritable plant mecca - home to around a tenth of all China's plant species ranging from rhododendrons, viburnums and maples to many interesting pines and firs. One of the highlights has to be *Davidia*, the Dove Tree, introduced by Ernest Wilson when collecting for Veitch and Son.

Further North from Emeishan, and another highlight, Nine Villages Valley in Jiuzhaigou is a botanical paradise, with over 2,500 recorded species. A national park since 1984 and covering some 2,000 square km, this wonderful alpine valley is dotted with 114 lakes – ranging from

light turquoise to greens and blues in colour, and 17 waterfalls. We explored the national park on foot and had a private bus to cover some of the longer distances, and were richly rewarded with plants ranging including *Paeonia veitchii*, *Cypripedium tibeticum*, several *Acer*, *Betula*, *Deutzia*, *Hydrangea* and *Philadelphus* species beneath mature *Abies* and *Picea* species.

Towards the end of the expedition, two days are also spent exploring the magnificent Jade Dragon Snow Mountain in Lijiang, in the province of Yunnan. Lijiang old town itself is fascinating – a maze of canals, cobbled alleyways and old wooden houses. The reason it is included in our trip is that it is also home to a quarter of China's plant species, a thought that is really quite

staggering. As well as plenty of woody plants, I was delighted to see the famed *Primula forrestii* – named after George Forrest himself and the rare alpine *Stellera* – in abundance.

This is a journey filled with memorable experiences and wonderful sights – with enticing names and surrounded by myths and legends.

But for me personally, the sight of *Primula forrestii*, a landmark species, growing on rocky banks, along with *Daphne* and *Stellera* growing in gravel on a dry river bed in Gang Ho Ba in sight of the Jade Dragon Snow Mountain, was quite simply breathtaking especially when years before I was growing the same species in cultivation. I couldn't help thinking how much better it would have been to have seen them in the wild first. It transported me to the time of the Plant Seekers, Ernest Wilson, George Forrest, Frank Kingdon Ward and Joseph Rock, and reminded me of just what a remarkable contribution these intrepid explorers made, particularly to our own gardens in the UK."







What is it that makes Southeast Asia appealing?


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TRAVEL TALES

What was the highlight of your trip?

For those who are a little more adventurous you should try, 'Stinky Tofu' which is made from fermented tofu, fried in oil and served with a pickled cabbage garnish.





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IN PURSUIT OF PANDAS

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THE INSIDE TRACK

South Korea is a classic combination of old Asia and new and is a brand new destination to explore with Wendy Wu Tours. As one of the most mountainous countries in Asia, it has some of the most dramatic scenery in the region. When you combine that with a unique culture, exceptional cuisine and its buzzing cities you get a fascinating place to visit.



Here, Wendy Wu Tours' Marketing Manager, Ben Briggs, shares his insider knowledge following a recent trip to the 'Land of the morning calm'.



Q What was your first impression when you arrived in Seoul, the capital?

A From the outset, Seoul seemed to have a relaxed vibe and was fairly ordered for a large Asian capital city. It doesn't have the frenetic feel of many Asian cities, like Bangkok or Hong Kong for example. The city is split up into many different districts, arty ones, modern ones, cultural quarters and student areas. Seoul felt like it had found its own identity and was very comfortable with it.



Q What did you most enjoy about Seoul?

A I loved the traditional tea houses, which can be found all over the city but there are areas well known for this traditional craft, such as the Palace quarter, Insadong. It is customary to take off your shoes before entering and sit on the floor beneath low, hand crafted wooden

tables. The menu of teas, both hot and iced was mind boggling but I settled on a '5 flower iced tea' which was recommended. But you could have had all manner of teas including jasmine, ginseng, plum, ginger and lemon. There are also some amazing food markets, the biggest of which is the Gwangjinag market. The variety of vegetables, meat and fish on display was astonishing. Definitely a place not to be missed in Seoul.



Q How was the Korean food?

A Incredible! I was very impressed by the food in general in Korea. Most meals have lots of small dishes to share with rices, broths, meat and vegetables. It is also customary to take off your shoes in most local restaurants and sit on the floor. Not always comfortable but at least it felt like you were living like a local!

A BBQ is also very popular, where you have your own personal hot coals in front of you on the table. They light the coals for you and then give you the raw meat and vegetables and leave you to it.

Q Did you visit the Demilitarised Zone (DMZ) between North and South Korea?

A Yes I did. Of all the sights that South Korea promised, it was perhaps the DMZ that I was most looking forward to. This 4km area between the north and south borders, divided the country in two at the end of the Korean War (1950-1953). This was a strange place to visit as it is both a major tourist sight as well as being potentially a very dangerous place to be. We were led around by two American soldiers who were based there as part of the UN force.

At one stage we were standing about 200 yards from a North Korean guard staring right at us with a pair of binoculars. Very unnerving! At a certain point on the ground, in the meeting hut where north and south generals gather to talk, you can have one foot in North Korea and one foot in the south. The obligatory photo had to be taken of course.

Q Did you get out into the countryside?

A Yes, we were lucky enough to visit the stunning Bulguksa Temple, an ancient Buddhist temple complex a few hours from the port city of Busan in the south east of Korea. It was a sprawling complex of beautiful buildings set high in the hills. A truly memorable end to our trip.

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
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



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
